



Fort Warden is located in the town of Port Townsend, on the Olympic Penninsula about 60 road miles NW of Seattle. Several cross-sound ferry routes connect to SR 104, and the ferry crossing the Hood Canal. The various routes are well marked.

From the North, there is a direct ferry connection from Keystone to Port Townsend. From the Seattle area the shortest route is via the ferry to Winslow and then via the Hood Canal ferry. From Tacoma take SR 16 across the Narrows and then through Bremerton to Hood Canal. If coming from South of Olympia you can take US 101 all the way to the Port Townsend road, avoiding the ferries entirely.

Please remember that the ferries can be busy on weekends, so allow some extra time. Bay View Farm

OPEN FORGE AND PIG ROAST

May 26th (Sat.) and May 27th (Sun.)

OPEN TO ALL, NO CHARGE, SOME COME TO SEE, SOME COME TO DO, ALL ARE WELCOME

Open Forge at Bay View Farm 16 miles West of Portland. Go out Sunset Highway (#26-West) to Helvetia Road. Travel North on Helvetia to Phillips Road. Turn West on Phillips and the Open Forge is just past the intersection of Phillips and Valley Vista. Yellow anvil signs will clearly mark the way once you turn off the Sunset Highway (Hwy #26).

We have a large pasture to park vehicles. Chem toilets will be set up to make things easy. A large barn has lots of room for sleeping bags and our pig feed and chalk talks will take place in the barn.

Added attractions.... a 1 scale steam tractor, 100% operational.

Demonstration on what steam will do to the flexability of wood. Several demonstrators, one on tool making, one on fancy work with tubing and pipe. The Harry Robinson School of Chain Making. Every person that wants to will be encouraged to make a link for the chain. Some of the more experienced smiths will spell Harry, helping people. A great chance for a beginner to get a little one on one instruction. At the end of the Open Forge we will have a chain with a hook at each end. Each link to be signed by the maker. 200 lb. roast pig potluck dinner, we provide the pig, you all bring the rest. Pig sandwiches the second day if any left. Chalk talk on tool steels by a metalurgist.

A new shed has been built to house the outside forge. The main shop has been expanded and will offer more room. No less than two forges going. We will promote in the Portland Metro Area heavily, and hope for some good press and TV coverage.

Buy, sell, trade.....swap meet atmosphere is encouraged. We also ask you to bring something for iron in the hat.

As hosts of an Open Forge, there is no way Kathy and I can pull off a fun event without your strong support. Once the pig, port-a-potties and other details are taken care of we are done. It's people that make these Open Forges special and we are hoping for a large turnout. Come early, stay late, eat well, bend a little iron, have the time of your life.

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
The Dragon Fire Charcoal Retort



The Dragon Fire Charcoal Retort is a portable charcoaling system capable of producing up to 1200 pounds of charcoal daily. Its simplicity, flexibility, and clean operating characteristics allow for its usage of many different wood supplies in all types of working environments.

The Dragon Fire System is a retort in which the wood is destructively distilled. The retort chamber is heated from below by a wood fire, and from the flue gases which are routed thru the chamber. The gases that are evolved from the charring process are piped into the firebox for combustion, resulting in a highly efficient, environmentally clean process. Cycle time is approximately 24-30 hours; 8-12 hours of heating, the remainder in cooling.
