

- 12. Next Board Meeting is set for July 18th.







The rings for this project serve as the outer border of whatever design use choose to occupy the negative space within the ring. The interior ironwork can be anchored to the ring in a fashion you deem suitable (rivels, collars, welds, etc). The only criteria is that the outer edge of the ring and the area around the mounting holes remain unobstructed (see framework lillustration at right).

Edge bend 1/4"x 1" hot rolled flat, it should be perfectly round and exactly 10" in diameter. The mounting holes should not be drilled; they will be drilled just prior to assembly at the conference. See page 15, winter 1991 issue of the Arvil's ring for examples of work done for the 1990 ABANA Conference ring project.

The 1994 ABANA Conference will be held in St. Louis, Missouri at Washington University. I am pleased to tell you that it is possibly the best overall facility ever for a conference. The central location promises a large turn out as travel will be less expensive for more people.

The Blacksmiths Assn. of Missouri (BAM) is the host chapter. BAM member Lou Mueller is the conference chairman and I am delighted to tell you he is a most capable organizer.

We are planning a ring project which invites all ABANA chapters to participate. This could be the first time all chapters have had the opportunity to do something together. Here's how it works! Every chapter is invited to make one of these rings, (description and instruction included) the rings will then be joined. There are several ways this could happen. One strong thought is to have Francis Whitaker pick six of his choice and assemble them at the conference. This group would make the conference logo. The balance would make one or more groups of compatible design. All ring assemblies will be sold at auction for conference income. Each chapter can choose any method they like to produce the ring of their choice.

It may help to know BAM's past experience with ring projects. There have been two. Each time the membership was asked to make one, then a meeting was held to assemble them and they were sold. One is a bed head board in a bed and breakfast, the other decorates a restaurant.

Doug Hendrickson asked several ABANA members across the country to make one and assembled them for the 1990 ABANA conference and it was a big seller at that years auction.

One suggestion would be to have a chapter project the way BAM did. Have a judging, send the winner to represent your chapter at the 1994 conference, take the rest and assemble them for a chapter fund raiser.

What ever method you choose we wish you good luck and hope to have 100% chapter participation.

The ring should be shipped to BAM by March 1, 1994 to allow time for preparation by conference time.

ART JONES -- A MAN AND HIS HAMMER

"When all you have is a hammer, everything needs pounding."

Art Jones had a hammer--a 10,000 pound hammer-- and he pounded seamless rings, eye bolts, flanges, crank shafts, and tongs. He pounded his way through the heavy forge shop at Mare Island Naval Shipyard until he rose to the position of Superintendent. Then they took away his hammer and made him pound on a desk. Eventually, he discovered he was pounding his head against the wall. One day he came to a momentous decision.

He threw the desk out the window, accepted a position with Michael Bondi Metal Design and was transformed (practically overnight) into an Artist Blacksmith. The rest, as they say, is history--and lucky for us.

Art came to the Great Northwest the week of April 12-18 to treat those of us lucky enough to be there, to a real hammerin' man's insights into the realm of the forge, the hammer, and the work (production, that is). We learned about insert dies, trough dies, closed dies, and die steel. We learned to forge small bites versus big bites, how to hammer and how not to hammer. Most of all, we learned that we all have a lot to learn and Art has a lot of learnin' up his sleeve. As always, the time was much too short--"the craft so long to learn".

The focus of the workshop was "Design for Production." The task to design a pot rack for production, exercising all the pertinent design criteria, i.e., period, style, technique, joinery, etc. Phil Baldwin and Russell Jaqua aided this process. Then, using some of Art's tooling and plenty of his advise and expertise, produce a pot rack in a cost-effective method so as to actually be able to sell it to someone at a profit--WHAT A CONCEPT!


Everyone come up with a design--all very different, and some very, very different. Most of the pot racks were finished and hanging so the multitudes could see them during the Spring Conference. Comments of "wonderful," "exciting," "different," and "did he really do that?" were heard throughout the three days.

Art seemed to withstand/tolerate us with very good humor--even Joe Elliott's "I read about that somewhere" comments didn't seem to phase him. Of course, Art has been training himself with large doses of serenity by doing Japanese-style gardens around his home in Vallejo, California. 
Thanks, Art, for sharing your expertise with all of us. We really enjoyed having you come to the Northwest.




Under the hammer.

Importance of delicate blows demonstrated in the making of tongs. *Photos by Ina Culberson*






Art Jones with candlestick forged from 4-inch square block under 3B Nahzel power hammer (Photo by Ina Culberson)



Mockette for gates




Gates for private residence in Southern California. Solid bronze - alloys C630 and C954. (Photo courtesy of Art Jones)


MORE PARTICIPATION SOUGHT

The quilting project comprised of blocks depicting NWBA members is in the works. We would like to see more members come to us and want to be included. All you need do is provide us with your business card (if you





RUSS MAUGANS GATE

Northwest College Driveway Gates at the Brightwood, Oregon cottage of William H. and Barbara White. Bill is well known for his keen interest in preserving information of historical events, and the environment about the area of Brightwood. At Mr. White's wishes, these gates were designed to depict objects of nature about the place they were to be used.

Soooo - we made the two six foot frames of 2 x 3 tubing. The owls at the top outside corners, the buck, bear, trees, tree stump and beavers, were all cut from 5/8" plate. The outline of Mt. Hood and other hills are of 1/2" square. The stream and fish were forged.

The driveway to the cottage has an easement on it, permitting the public to pass through to the Salmon River. The bear is a "people" gate within the large one, his paw latching to the tree stump. We know this is a male bear, because it has ball-bearing hinges.

Editor's Column


The first thing I need to do is to thank Ina Culberson for all of the work she has done on this issue. Ina, thank you very, very much.
